John Dzwonczyk Announces Retirement from Avon Lake Board of Municipal Utilities After Nearly 27 Years of Service

AVON LAKE, Ohio — September 15, 2026 — John Dzwonczyk, PE, CFPS (retired), Chairman of the Avon Lake Board of Municipal Utilities, has announced his resignation from the Board following nearly 27 years of service. His resignation will be effective October 31, 2026.

In his letter to fellow Board members and Avon Lake Regional Water staff, Dzwonczyk reflected on the accomplishments achieved during his tenure and expressed pride in the organizational growth and improvements realized through years of collaboration.

“I am proud of what we have achieved together and the organizational growth and improvement that we have realized.”

Dzwonczyk credited teamwork as a driving force behind the utility’s progress and encouraged Board members and staff to view his departure as another milestone in the organization’s long history of service. Looking ahead, he emphasized the opportunities that remain as the utility moves into its second century of providing quality water utility service to the community.

“Mr. Dzwonczyk’s nearly 27 years of service represent an extraordinary commitment to Avon Lake and to the customers and communities served by our utility,” said Rob Munro, Chief Utilities Executive. “His leadership, institutional knowledge and dedication to excellence have helped shape the organization we are today. We are deeply grateful for his service and wish him the very best in retirement.”

Although his time on the Board will conclude on October 31, 2026, Dzwonczyk has offered to remain available for consultation after his departure, underscoring his continued commitment to the organization and its future.
